Hands-on Training for Outgrowers
Increases Yield and Revenue

Capital Investment

Over the years, outgrowers for Eden Tree have experienced difficulty in timely land preparation ahead of the planting season. With support from GhanaVeg, Eden Tree Limited purchased a brand new tractor to ease this challenge. The tractor purchase lessens the burden of continually hiring tractors – rarely available just when the need for them is greatest.

Technical Support

Eden Tree assists outgrowers with hands-on technical instruction from its own certified agronomist through a Ghana Veg-supported quarterly agronomic training program. Eden Tree has increased its outgrower participation from 55 to 90 farmers as a result of this regularly available training.

The training program uses Eden Tree's farm plotss as demonstration sites. This

beneficial attention has reduced the incidence of pests and diseases over the past three years.

Outgrower Certification

Currently, Eden Tree as a company and about 20 outgrowers have been certified under Ghana's first National Certification scheme (Ghana Green Label) for the strict good agricultural practices the company follows. Eden Tree's Managing Director Mrs. Catherine Krobor Edusei Benson expained, "Working to see a healthy and quality vegetable sector remains key to the success of Eden Tree. Customers can confidently eat vegetables from Eden Tree due to its rigorous quality control measures before sale."

Yields and Quality

Support from GhanaVeg has resulted in significant increases in yield and quality (30% and 70 %, respectively). This is made possible through the inputs and machinery supplied to outgrowers.

"Even though our ultimate goal in terms of yield is 99%, we now stand at



about 60% in terms of yield. We can say, we have done better comparatively and reduced cost of production for outgrowers. With this figure, we meet the demand of our customers easily without thinking about where or how to get quality and healthy produce," said Benson.

Revenue and Market

Eden Tree has made appreciable revenue strides of about a 70% increase, which they are working on to have about 100% in the near future. Currently, Eden Tree is looking at doubling production to serve the new markets that are springing up within the Accra Metropolis.

Challenges

The challenges unique to working with outgrowers is something Eden Tree approaches cautiously, because outgrowers are fundamental to their business. For example, if an outgrower at some point needs money for a child's school fees or ill health, he or she might sell their produce elsewhere due to the immediate need, while going to Eden Tree might delay a day or two.

Eden Tree has learned over the years that these types of challenges exist, and they must find ways to cushion such shocks in order to remain in business.

Way Forward

In about 3 years, the company expects to be looking at acquiring "a 50 acre (plot) of land" for what Mrs. Benson calls "block farming" for their outgrowers to cultivate. Outgrowers will be given about an acre or more depending on their capacity to cultivate. These outgrowers will be

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supervised by a group of skilled and experienced Farm Managers.
